ABOUT YPAM

YPAM (Yokohama International Performing Arts Meeting) is a professional meeting and performance festival where arts workers gather to exchange ideas, build networks, and discuss various issues within contemporary performing arts. Founded in 1995 as TPAM (Tokyo Performing Arts Market) and relocating in 2011 to Yokohama, YPAM is recognized as one of the most influential platforms for international performing arts exchange in Asia and the world.

YPAM2022 PROGRAM

Since 2021, YPAM has been increasing its focus on and engagement with the local areas of Yokohama. We have opened a new Fringe Center in Hatsune-cho, launched the "Unique Venue Development" program to highlight alternative performance spaces in the city, and this year we will host our **YPAM Exchange** meetings at The Cantonese Club in Yokohama Chinatown.

While supporting artists and industry professionals to engage with the creative history of Yokohama, we are also embracing new approaches to international exchange. This year, the **YPAM Exchange** program will take place both in-person and online, providing multiple ways for professionals to meet and collaborate both in Yokohama and from around the world.

This year, **YPAM Direction** features works by artists from China, Japan, Malaysia and Taiwan. The award-winning Taiwanese dance piece *LUNA* by **Bulareyaung Dance Company** and the new dance work *Jasmine Town* by young Beijing-based **choreographer Yang Zhen** in collaboration with multiple dancers and local residents of Yokohama Chinatown will be presented alongside **Five Arts Centre**'s *A Notional History*, which examines the history of the Communist Party of Malaya, and **OLTA**'s *Nippon Ideology (tentative title)*, a YPAM commission that examines how Japanese national ideology is encountered in daily life.

Presented as a work-in-progress at TPAM2019, *A Notional History* makes its return for YPAM2022. Building on the critically-acclaimed *Baling*, this performance examines the conflicting historical accounts of the Anti–British National Liberation War in Malaysia, drawing on interviews with exiled members of the Communist Party of Malaya.



2) YPAM Exchange (for professional networking)

YPAM Exchange is a program for performing arts professionals to meet, exchange ideas, and discuss issues facing contemporary performing arts. The exchange program takes place across multiple venues in Yokohama, including **The Cantonese Club** in Yokohama Chinatown, **BankART KAIKO**, **Former Daiichi Bank Yokohama Branch**, as well as via the online platform **Swapcard**.

Swapcard is a platform for new forms of events that use digital communication to expand the meeting experience. It also offers social networking features that enable you to build a network across multiple events, and is now being deployed by such performing arts markets and platforms as PAMS (Korea), APAM (Australia), and CINARS (Canada).

Fondly remembered as a highlight of previous TPAM programs, the late-night meeting point **Amazon Club** is back again! Relocated to a new venue in Yokohama, but still with all the same unique atmosphere, the Amazon Club is the spot to meet new people, spark collaborations and unwind from the day.

3) YPAM Joint Program

The YPAM Joint Program is a program in special cooperation with arts and cultural organizations of Yokohama and abroad. This year the joint program is presented with the long-term partner of YPAM, **KAAT Kanagawa Arts Theatre**; the long-standing performing arts market since 1984, **CINARS**; and **Yokohama Red Brick Warehouse No. 1** that established contemporary dance culture in Yokohama.

4) YPAM Fringe (open-call program)



YPAM Fringe is an open-call program for independent performances taking place in the Yokohama/Kanagawa Area during YPAM2022. The Fringe program is an opportunity for emerging and independent artists to show their work to the professional participants and audience of YPAM.

The **YPAM Fringe Center** (2-43-6 Hatsune-cho, Naka-ku, Yokohama) has officially opened. This cozy bar offers a place to meet other Fringe participants and learn about the performing arts scene in Yokohama. It will be open everyday during YPAM2022.
